TODAY: Call-In Day for Immigration Reform

America's immigration system is broken. Over 11 million undocumented immigrants live in the shadows of our communities. Families face decades-long backlogs in acquiring visas, workers are left without protections, children are left behind as parents are deported, and LGBT Americans cannot sponsor the visa of a spouse. We can, and we must, do better.

Women of Reform Judaism (WRJ) adopted a resolution supporting immigration at its first assembly in 1915 and over the years has continued to call for fair immigration policies. Our 2009 resolution asks us to: "Call upon Congress to adopt and the president to sign comprehensive immigration reform legislation that would include a path to legalization for the millions of undocumented immigrants in the United States." Today, we have the opportunity to do just that.

Vandalism Against Women of the Wall Board Member

Yesterday, vandals spray-painted hateful graffiti outside of the Jerusalem home of Peggy Cidor, a board member of Women of the Wall. In response to the attack, Rabbi Marla J. Feldman, Executive Director of Women of Reform Judaism, and Rabbi David Saperstein, Director of the Religious Action Center of Reform Judaism, issued a statement strongly condemning the attack.

The statement expressed "outrage by today's vandalism at the Jerusalem home of Women of the Wall board member Peggy Cidor. The graffiti messages, which included phrases such as, 'Women of the Wall are wicked,' 'Peggy, your time has expired' and 'Jerusalem is Holy,' seek to intimidate women and those who stand with them in support of women's right to pray. Those responsible for these heinous acts must be held accountable for their actions."

It concluded by noting that "the overt threats implied by the vandalism inside the hallway of the apartment building of a leader of Women of the Wall serve to remind us of the utmost importance of the Women of the Wall's efforts to advance religious pluralism, democracy, and gender equality in Israel. We call on the Israeli judicial system to hold the perpetrators accountable."
