

1st Place Social Action

Knitting Circle

Women of Emanu-El River Hills, WI

What started out as a knitting circle of women providing hospitalized congregants of Emanu-El B'ne Jeshurun Congregation with comfort shawls has grown into a social action project for the Women of Emanu-El to knit chemo caps, hats, scarves, shawls, and lap robes for various organizations throughout metropolitan Milwaukee. The Women of Emanu-El volunteer knitters started the Knitting Circle with donated yarns and other supplies provided by generous congregants. The knitters' projects included chemo caps donated to Children's Hospital of Wisconsin and the Cancer Treatment Center of Froedtert Hospital. Other knitted items were given to school children, individuals with mental health issues, women and children living at homeless shelters, homebound adults getting services from the Jewish Family Service and winter hats to refugees from Burma and Kenya who had resettled in Milwaukee. Besides giving to the congregation and community, the Knitting Circle helped to build social connections within Women of Emanu-El by meeting every six weeks from September through May. This very dedicated and talented group of knitters continues to grow and do their mitzvah projects for their congregation and the community.
