WRJ 2015 Fried Leadership Conference

From January 30 to February 1, 2015, WRJ gathered "deep in the heart" of Austin, TX for our biennial Fried Leadership Conference (FLC). The conference welcomed over 230 women from more than 100 women's groups. Attendees included current and rising sisterhood leadership, WRJ Board members, and WRJ Board alumnae; and among these participants were 28 women from the Midwest District. We gathered at the AT&T Executive Education & Conference Center at the University of Texas-Austin campus. Together, we learned, we prayed and we played! All essential to developing the close ties to other women charged with leading their congregations' women's organizations that help us build success. In fact, first-timer Mary Fisher (Temple Beth El Sisterhood in South Bend, Indiana) said "I appreciated learning that some of the concerns our small sisterhood has are the same concerns that are being discussed in much larger congregations as well. Thanks to attendees being open and caring I came home with new ways to address some concerns with our membership."

The programs included sessions on developing leadership skills to thrive in sisterhood and community life, and also covered today's issues close to the hearts of women, WRJ, and the Reform Movement. With a focus on social justice, Israel advocacy, and spirituality, it was a meaningful and busy weekend! There were blocks of workshops led by WRJ Board members and WRJ staff on a wide variety of topics, including: fundraising, running effective meetings, facilitating transition and change, mentoring and developing new leaders, enhancing WRJ's involvement in social justice, organizing successful programming, providing effective marketing and communications, and preventing and managing conflict. One of the most powerful programs was led by Rabbi David Wolfman, who helped participants consider how to engage the younger generations and reimagine their sisterhood's mission and relationship to the Reform Jewish community. Midwest District Sisterhood President Leslie Kemp (Temple Beth El in Madison, Wisconsin) said that after sitting in on both of Rabbi Wolfman's workshops, "it was a wake up call that it was really time to sit back and remember 'Why we are here and do what we do', and hoping that getting back to that core will re-energize us".

Beautiful Shabbat services on Friday night, Saturday morning and Havdalah were led by WRJ District Presidents including our own Lynne Turry, along with Songleader-In-Residence Julie Silver, who afterward held a special song session where many of the WRJ women were dancing in the aisles. Sisterhood presidents, WRJ event first-timers, and WRJ District Area Directors chanted the *aliyot* for Torah readers Cheryl Harper, Trina Novak, and Jackie Zev, respectively and WRJ Executive Director Marla J. Feldman delivered an inspiring D'var Torah on Parashat B'shalach. The services were so moving that many of us found our eyes filling with tears. Naomi Shapiro, Sisterhood Co-President at Bet Shalom Congregation in Minnetonka, Minnesota "always finds it a very special experience to share services with my WRJ sisters and having Julie Silver leading us in song was just icing on the cake".

Following lunch, we visited the Lyndon Baines Johnson Presidential Library, where we listened to President Johnson's phone conversations held in the Oval Office, viewed items from his life and time in office, and learned about his impact on the civil rights movement and other social justice issues. Upon return to the hotel, we headed off to WRJ "Face Time" sessions, in which we discussed issues facing our respective affinity groups, including sisterhood presidents from various-

sized congregations, WRJ District Area Directors, fundraisers and YES Fund chairs, membership chairs, marketing and communications chairs and WRJ Board Members.

Dinner was a real highlight, with Texas-style barbecue and an authentic honky-tonk band played while the women danced the evening away in their finest Texas attire (did you know that many of our Midwest District women own cowboy hats and boots?). Check out Facebook!

Sunday morning featured an optional town hall-style drop-in session, followed by the final event: the YES Fund Breakfast. WRJ President Blair C. Marks welcomed everyone and WRJ Executive Committee member Rozan Anderson (Temple Beth El in Madison, Wisconsin) introduced keynote speaker Rabbi Galit Cohen-Kedem, of Congregation Kodesh Ve'Chol in Holon, Israel, who spoke about her experience as a female Reform rabbi in Israel and the significant impact WRJ has had in furthering gender and religious equality there; as well as the importance of voting for ARZA in the World Zionist Congress elections in order to further gender and religious equality in Israel. WRJ Vice President Sharon K. Benoff spoke about and helped raise money for the important work of the YES Fund, and honored several members with presentations of their new Lifeline pins.

So yes, we learned and we prayed, but let's not forget about the PLAY! Linn Ullenbrauck (WRJ Board Member, Midwest District VP Marketing and Communications and Skokie Illinois-based Temple Beth Israel Sisterhood Board Member) loves connecting and networking with her colleagues and peers throughout WRJ. "I have made friends across the country and connected with WRJ leaders to learn from them so I can be a better leader to my sisterhood." What better way to achieve this than to spend social time together? We are very proud of the warmth and hospitality that Midwest District extends to our WRJ sisters... and FLC was not an exception! Fifteen of us from the Midwest arrived a day early to "Experience Austin". Word spread and we had another fifteen from other WRJ Districts join us for a city double-decker bus tour, a Texas barbecue dinner at Stubbs and live music at The Mohawk. Friday morning we breakfasted at The Driskill Hotel (one of the oldest in Austin) and toured the State Capitol. Of course, each day was not complete without significant time in the hotel's pub/restaurant to bond with other WRJ women from around the world!

WRJ International Board Member and Midwest District Past President and Board Member Susan Pittelman (Congregation Shalom Sisterhood, Milwaukee WI) sums it up perfectly: "The WRJ Fried Leadership Conference was fabulous! The sessions I participated in were informative and thought-provoking — and the services were beautiful and inspiring! I loved spending time with my longtime WRJ friends and meeting so many wonderful women who are just beginning their WRJ journeys."

Speak! [breathe]: What I Learned in Speakers Development Training

I enrolled for the program, thinking that it'd be a good investment in my personal development. I am a past sisterhood president, a member of the WRJ Board and Executive Committee, and first vice president of my congregation. I've spoken professionally throughout my career, though not frequently. Since I'd like to represent WRJ, my congregation, other organizations, and myself as well as possible, I figured that it would be great to enhance my skills and comfort with public speaking. [speak s low ly]

I got so much more from this workshop than I'd ever imagined! [use inflection!]

Before heading to Austin, we'd been asked to prepare a three-minute speech from a list of topics or one of our choosing. We were also given a rubric of things to which we should pay attention, such as supporting our ideas with stories and examples. I opted to speak about mission and vision statements – and hoped to bring these to life as fully as possible!

To start the day, we heard from many course leaders: WRJ Vice Presidents fredi Bleeker Franks and Sara B. Charney and WRJ Board Members Karen S. Sim and Isabel Einzig-Wein, who worked with us on topics such as:

- Presence: inspiring audiences with power and authenticity (pause, etc.)
- Principles of public speaking
- Delivering our messages: conducting workshops and presenting D'vrei Torah
- Engaging listeners and fielding questions

Some of us had wondered about the efficacy of preparing our speeches before we were presented with this material, but it turned out to be just the right base from which to work. We could think about our upcoming speeches as we absorbed information.

All too soon [!!!], it was time to give our presentations! For many, it was the first time speaking before such a large group. Others were more seasoned. For all, it turned out to be the perfect safe and nurturing environment. [check posture]

We all supported and learned from one another, as you might imagine! Our facilitators gave expert feedback after each presentation. Not only did I learn so much about a variety of topics, but I was incredibly moved by what we shared with one another in that place. [pause]

Some of us went on to address the whole assembly that weekend – including a couple who had never previously spoken publicly and had been terrified by the thought before the workshop. We cheered each other on – at least silently!

The training was so meaningful, we now have a group set up on Yammer so that we may continue sharing materials and ideas. [pause]

For me, the entire conference was wonderful. The Speaker Development Program was one major highlight! [look around, smile!]

WRJ plans to offer this training more frequently in upcoming months and years, perhaps atWRJ District conventions, as well as at future WRJ Fried Leadership Conferences, WRJ Assemblies, and board meetings. We offer facilitators – our own members – who are experienced, engaging, and empowering, [pause] and fellow participants who will encourage you to be your best self – someone with the confidence to get in front of others and speak about that which is important to you!

I urge you to join in when you see a Speaker Development Program announced! It may transform how you view interacting with others!

And don't forget that WRJ and our Districts provide seasoned speakers to come visit your sisterhoods and congregations, offering a wide variety of presentations and workshops. Information on requesting a speaker is readily available on our web site, or you may feel free to contact me.

Temple Israel Minneapolis Revises the Leadership Structure

Two years ago when I chaired the nominating committee it was really difficult to get women to agree to come on the Sisterhood Board. They did not want to commit to monthly meetings or a 2 year term. In the fall of 2013 we began not getting enough people to an Exec meeting and never had a quorum to get any business done. In Feb 2014 we formed a bylaws committee to look at our Board structure and bylaws. Along with the Presidium of Past Presidents and Rabbi Gertman we created a new governance structure and overhauled our bylaws. The philosophy was discussed at several exec meeting this past Fall and approved in Oct and in Jan by the full Board. They still need to be approved by the full membership this spring.

Here are some highlights:

- We eliminated the Exec Committee and shrunk our Board of Directors from 80+ to 16 with a majority present for a quorum.
 Co-VP's get one vote so women could alternate who attends the meetings.
- Our meetings have moved away from department reports (they are submitted via email before the meeting) to brainstorming and discussion driven. This is not in the bylaws but a fundamental change so that Board member time is worthwhile.
- We added our WRJ rep to the Board and a Parliamentarian as a Presidential appointee without a vote. Our assigned clergy
 is on the Board but does not have a vote.
- We changed the name of VP of Administration to VP of Development.
- We added a VP of Marketing and Communications.
- We are emphasizing the need for department committee so that the VP's are delegating and not doing everything themselves. We are fostering and grooming these (event chairs, committee members) new leaders to be future Board members.
- We decreased the meeting to 6 per year and at least one every quarter.
- We eliminated the Extended Exec Committee and created an Advisory Board of past presidents, WRJ National and District Board members and honorary lifetime members who will meet and advise the Board and the President as requested.

Both camps are considered to be the "crown jewels" of the URJ camps, and we are fortunate they are in our own backyard!

But did you know that from A-Z, our camps offer such activities as: arts & crafts, basketball, biking, boating, campfires, canoeing, cooking, dance, drama, drawing and painting, fishing, floor hockey, foosball, ga-ga, havdallah, horseback riding, Israeli dancing, kickball, martial arts, media, meshugenah races, music, Oconomostock, paddle boarding, photography, physical fitness, pillow polo, ping pong, rock climbing, ropes course, sailing, soccer, softball, song sessions, Shabbat, Star Spangled Mesibah, swimming, talent shows, tennis, tetherball, teva (nature), tubing, ultimate Frisbee, volleyball, wakeboarding, waterslides, and zipline. And yes, there are some very interesting activities that would need further explanation!

After the untimely death of Debbie Friedman in 2011, the Midwest District created a scholarship in memory of Debbie for Tiferet campers who have a passion for Jewish music. Every summer, two campers receive a \$250 campership to attend Tiferet.

Starting in 2013 and continuing through this year 2015, WRJ Midwest District is supporting the construction of the new greenhouse at OSRUI. On January 29, I spoke with Jerry Kaye, OSRUI's Camp Director, by phone. He reported several updates about the greenhouse. Under OSRUI Associate Director Susan Alexander's leadership, the greenhouse is complete. The total cost was \$55,000 so our WRJ Midwest District donations contributed to the greenhouse along with a gift from another party.

- The greenhouse is 40'x20', is heated, and has water as well as useful workshop tables.
- Susan has planted some "pilot plantings" to be used in the new garden that was started summer 2014.
- We'll be able to see, touch, and feel the garden and the greenhouse at Kallah this April!

The YES Fund was named in 1955, but the tzedakah roots of WRJ that initially were centered around rabbinic scholarships date to 1913, the same year the organization was founded. Over the past century, the YES Fund has raised millions of dollars through a combination of dedicated campaigns and product sales for projects including: building the dormitory at Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion (HUC-JIR) in Cincinnati and the URJ Headquarters in New York, establishing the Jewish Braille Institute (JBI International), founding the North American Federation of Temple Youth (NFTY), and helping to create the first URJ camp.

Established in 1973, the WRJ Or Ami "Light of My People" Awards for Special Achievement in Programming recognizes exemplary social justice, community service, and educational programming that serves as a model for other WRJ Districts and sisterhoods.
