MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT



Dear Midwest District Sisters,

The Midwest District Board of Directors for 2012-2014 took office just three months ago and we already have implemented many changes and innovations. The Executive Committee has been hard at work, and they, along with committee chairs, have made a great start on the goals that were established at the Board Orientation, held at District Convention.

I hope you have all enjoyed the M'Kasher newsletter that has been sent out for *Rosh Chodesh*. In each addition, I have shared with you a little insight into the significance of the new month, provided information about upcoming events, announced *simchas* and sorrows, and reported on district correspondence. If there is something that you would like to see added to this monthly communication, please feel free to share your ideas with me.

We have changed our approach to Shabbat messages. We decided to stop forwarding the WRJ Shabbat Message to our Midwest District Board, since many of our sisters receive it directly from WRJ. I suspect our decision was the right one, since only three people have requested to be on our distribution list to receive the WRJ Shabbat Message. If you would like to be added to the distribution list, please let me know.

A Midwest District Shabbat Message is being sent on a monthly basis now rather than a weekly basis. We have timed these messages for the middle of the Hebrew month, so that you are receiving communications from the district approximately every two weeks. The Midwest District Shabbat Message is an opportunity for Executive Committee members to express themselves on the Torah portion, hot topics in WRJ or the world around us, or whatever else they think would be of value to our members. Thanks to Sally Frank and Carol Berger for their beautiful words in December and January. Your feedback on whether these district communications are too much, too little, or just right would be greatly appreciated.

WRJ's Centennial celebration is well under way and Midwest District is developing plans to ensure that our sisterhoods get the most out of this once-in-a-lifetime opportunity. Michelle Scheinkopf, Vice President of Development and WRJ Projects, and Helen Gold, WRJ Projects Chair, have convened conference calls with the Centennial Ambassadors in Midwest District sisterhoods and plan to have more such calls. It is not too late to appoint an ambassador who can share information from WRJ about the Centennial projects with your sisterhood and help coordinate your participation. If you can't find the right person for the job, the Centennial Ambassadors already at work in the district will partner with unrepresented sisterhoods to make sure the Centennial does not pass you by.

One Midwest District Centennial project will be to encourage sisterhoods to collect 100 items for a local charitable organization. If you are concerned about being able to meet that goal within your sisterhood, Midwest District will help you coordinate with other sisterhoods on a joint collection project. When information on this project is distributed, make sure to contact us to be connected to other sisterhoods.

Finally, I want to remind you to reach out to the District Board. We are here for you, whether you want to get program ideas, bring in a speaker, or learn more about WRJ or the district. Feel free to call me to vent about that difficult member or your synagogue's bureaucracy or just to chat – hearing from you is the best part of being president of the Midwest District.

WRJ MIDWEST DISTRICT RETURNS TO CINCINNATI FOR THE FRIED LEADERSHIP CONFERENCE

In 2006, Midwest District sponsored a trip to Cincinnati to experience the birthplace of American Reform Judaism. We returned January 25-27, 2013 for the Fried Leadership Conference. The biennial leadership conference, now called the Fried Leadership Conference (FLC for short), which is usually targeted at rising leaders of sisterhoods, was expanded in 2013 to include Centennial Ambassadors, WRJ Board members, and the WRJ Chai Society, the alumnae association of the WRJ Board. This year, there were more than 230 women in attendance from all over North America, including 23 women from WRJ Midwest District.

Midwest District members were front and center at the Fried Leadership Conference. **Rozan Anderson** of Temple Beth El in Madison, WI co-chaired the FLC. **Diane Kaplan** from Temple Israel in Minneapolis, MN is the Centennial co-Chair and helped lead the kick-off of the Centennial Celebration. The FLC was also the scene for the launch of the *Covenant of the Generations*, the newest in the Covenant series of writings from sisterhood women and others within the Reform movement, which was chaired by WRJ Midwest District Past President **Sherri Feuer** of Temple Israel, Minneapolis, MN.

WRJ took full advantage of the locale for the 2013 FLC. The weekend started with an optional tour of the National Underground Railroad Museum. "Not only was it fascinating to learn about the journeys of some of the newly freed slaves who made their way to and through Cincinnati, but there is a whole exhibit depicting current events that are begging for new WRJ Resolutions," explained **Denise Fogel**, president of Temple Israel Sisterhood in Minneapolis, MN. In addition to national history, we were privileged to learn about the history of Judaism in America from Rabbi Dr. Gary Zola, Executive Director of the American Jewish Archives. **Leslie Kemp** of Temple Beth El, Madison, WI said that learning "how far we have come as American Jewish women empowers me." Part of our history lesson included a visit to the Plum Street Temple, built in 1866.

One of the highlights of the FLC was the recording of "Limdu Heiteiv," a new WRJ anthem written by Beth Schafer in honor of the Centennial. **Jennifer Cramer**, president of BJBE Sisterhood in Deerfield, IL, said, "What a beautiful anthem, message, and experience to share with all of the WRJ women in attendance. I can hardly wait to hear the CD in December." **Diane Kaplan** of Temple Israel in Minneapolis commented that she "got teary-eyed when we started the 'sisters stanza'!" "What fun to join in together to create a WRJ legacy," added **Janet Buckstein** of Lakeside Congregation for Reform Judaism in Highland Park, IL.

The speakers and workshops inspired attendees. **Gail Gendler**, president of Mt. Zion Temple Sisterhood in St. Paul, MN said, "I feel like there is a path out there – I'm not certain where it will lead or exactly how it will be navigated, but [keynote speaker Rabbi B. Elka Abrahamson] helped provide the direction." The opportunity to get real answers from the "experts at the WRJ Town Hall" was particularly helpful to **Cheryl Stern**, president of Temple Chai Sisterhood in Long Grove, IL. **Sheri Yarosh** of Temple Israel in Minneapolis appreciated the opportunity "to take a social advocacy workshop from Associate Director of the RAC, Barbara Weinstein." Another participant from Temple Israel in Minneapolis, **Beth Birke**, said, "I feel equipped and empowered to assist in leading the changes that our Sisterhood is yearning for. I gleaned indispensable knowledge of where we started, what we as women of Reform Judaism have achieved, and where the future of our women must go."

Sherri Feuer summarized the experience for all of us: "We all had moments of clarity over the weekend. The discussions that ensued will lead to thoughtful evaluation that will serve our sisterhoods well as we move forward in visionary and planned ways to meet the needs of our women, now and in the future."

BEING 100 NEVER LOOKED (OR FELT) SO GOOD!

WRJ, Women of Reform Judaism, is the "parent" organization of all sisterhoods in North America and around the world. Do you know that WRJ is 100 years old, composed of 500 different groups, and 65,000 women strong? Founded in 1913 as The National Federation of Temple Sisterhoods (NFTS), it was born during the struggle for Women's Rights. The organization's name was changed in 1993 to Women of Reform Judaism to more accurately reflect the broader scope its work encompasses today.

So, 2013 is WRJ's Centennial Year. In commemoration of it, WRJ and sisterhoods all over the world are taking part in various activities, customized by individual sisterhoods and by districts. For example, our WRJ Midwest District has decided to have each participating sisterhood do a social action project, of their choosing, where the key theme is "100" — of whatever they decide. For example, a sisterhood could decide to make 100 meals for a local food pantry or visit 100 sick children in the hospital. It is totally up to each sisterhood.

To promote participation, each WRJ sisterhood has been asked to appoint a Centennial Ambassador. This woman is charged with sharing information on WRJ's various Centennial events, as well as motivating her sisterhood to take part in the various activities around it. The celebration year was officially kicked off January 25th-27th at the Fried Leadership Conference in Cincinnati, Ohio.

A host of activities will take place throughout the year and will include opportunities, such as the following. For more information on these and the many other Centennial events, visit WRJ's website — http://www.wrj.org/Centennial/WRJsFirst100Years.aspx.

<u>The Centennial Shabbat</u> — While officially held March 1st-2nd, sisterhoods are encouraged to have a Centennial Shabbat Celebration any time during this year. While WRJ has supplied a variety of resources for this, each sisterhood is encouraged to add their own "heart" to it.

The WRJ-AJA (American Jewish Archives) Centennial Archival Project — Sisterhoods have been asked to submit artifacts that really capture their sisterhood's unique qualities or activities. These artifacts will become part of a WRJ collection and will help to bring the story of WRJ for the past 100 years to life. There are guidelines for submission which can also be found on the WRJ website.

<u>The Unsung Heroines Program</u> — This recognition program has been created to honor WRJ members who have helped advance the goals of the organization, but have never been recognized for doing so.

These are just some of the many ways we can all be a part of this blue ribbon year in our collective WRJ sisterhood story.
