thinking about lately. Most of you who are reading this right now are leaders. You are sisterhood/women's group presidents and board members, WRJ Midwest District board members and WRJ North America board members; and you are leaders in your congregations, communities, and places of employment.

Perhaps it is top of mind for me because this is the time of year when many throughout WRJ are actively seeking new and continuing leaders to guide our future. Our nominating committees are hard at work talking with members about leadership opportunities. So, it is also a good time to consider why people step up.

Last weekend Michelle Scheinkopf and I had the great pleasure to participate in a leadership development workshop conducted by WRJ Immediate Past President Lynn Magid Lazar for Temple Beth El Sisterhood (TBE) in Madison, Wisconsin. Lynn led a group of current and incoming sisterhood leaders in a discussion of what is working well and where there are challenges at TBE. Finding and motivating new



leaders was a big part of our conversation. Perhaps the greatest insight for me was that everyone is different and why some step up to lead will be different as well.

When I think about my personal situation, I realize that in almost every organization I have joined over the years, I have taken on a leadership role. Why is that? I think that for me it is about making an impact on those organizations where I am passionate about their mission and work. Over the years these organizations have changed, ranging from developing women's leadership opportunities, to child abuse prevention, to my synagogue, and now to WRJ. For me, WRJ is all about shared vision and passion with sisters throughout the world.

Yes, it will help you to know where their passions lie, but it will also help you to form deeper relationships and life-long friendships.

These women work on our behalf to support WRJ's global initiatives to ensure the future of Reform Judaism and our goal of Tikkun Olam, and they support sisterhoods and women's groups throughout North America.

Finally, I would be remiss if I did not mention that our own Midwest District is starting our nominating process. Just last week our nominating chair, Lynne Turry, sent a survey out to our district board and we have asked that sisterhood presidents pass it along to their leaders (a link to the survey is included [here](#)). Critical Issues – Marilyn D. Glazer Immigration Reform February 2018



Immigration Reform – some things never change. This issue has been on WRJ's "radar" since 1945!

God upholds the cause of the fatherless and the widow, and befriends the stranger, providing him with food and clothing. You too must befriend the stranger, for you were strangers in the land of Egypt. (Deuteronomy 10:18-19)

This citation from Deuteronomy anchors Women of Reform Judaism's profound commitment to immigration reform in Jewish tradition. In fact, the commandment to welcome the stranger is in the Torah 36 times, more so than any other. If you're interested in gematria (significance of numbers in Judaism), you'll recognize that 36 is double 18, double יח. נח (chai) signifies the number 18, but is also the Hebrew word for life. This repetition illustrates the Jewish commitment to this topic; how much welcoming the stranger is in the lifeblood of what it means to be Jewish.

Since its founding, National Federation of Temple Sisterhoods (NFTS, now WRJ), has been engaged in immigration reform. In fact, one of the very first **resolutions** NFTS passed in 1915 was about immigration reform. As Reform Jewish women, members of NFTS and WRJ have deep personal connections to this issue as well. From hearing the cries of help and profoundly understanding the call to action in the 1940s and 1950s, our women have pushed the Reform Movement and our nations to take in immigrants, to offer asylum—acting on Jewish faith, American values, and an insightful responsibility to humanity.

- 1947 Resolution: Emergency Immigration Legislation
- 1946 Resolution: Plight of Displaced Persons
- 1945 Resolution: Displaced Persons

The crisis in Europe yielded not despair, but consistent dedication to human rights around the world. In the past thirty years, WRJ has passed resolutions calling for asylum for those fleeing violence, those seeking family reunification, and all those whose hearts turn to the United States and Canada, looking for greater opportunity for themselves and their families.

- 1995 Resolution: Immigration
- 1991 Resolution: Aspects of World Jewry: Celebration and Concern

In celebrating Women's History Month, we look back at our dedication to this one issue of crucial importance today. WRJ has been a leader for nearly 100 years on this issue alone, and it is with pride that we celebrate our own history. Urge your members of Congress to pass comprehensive immigration reform!
